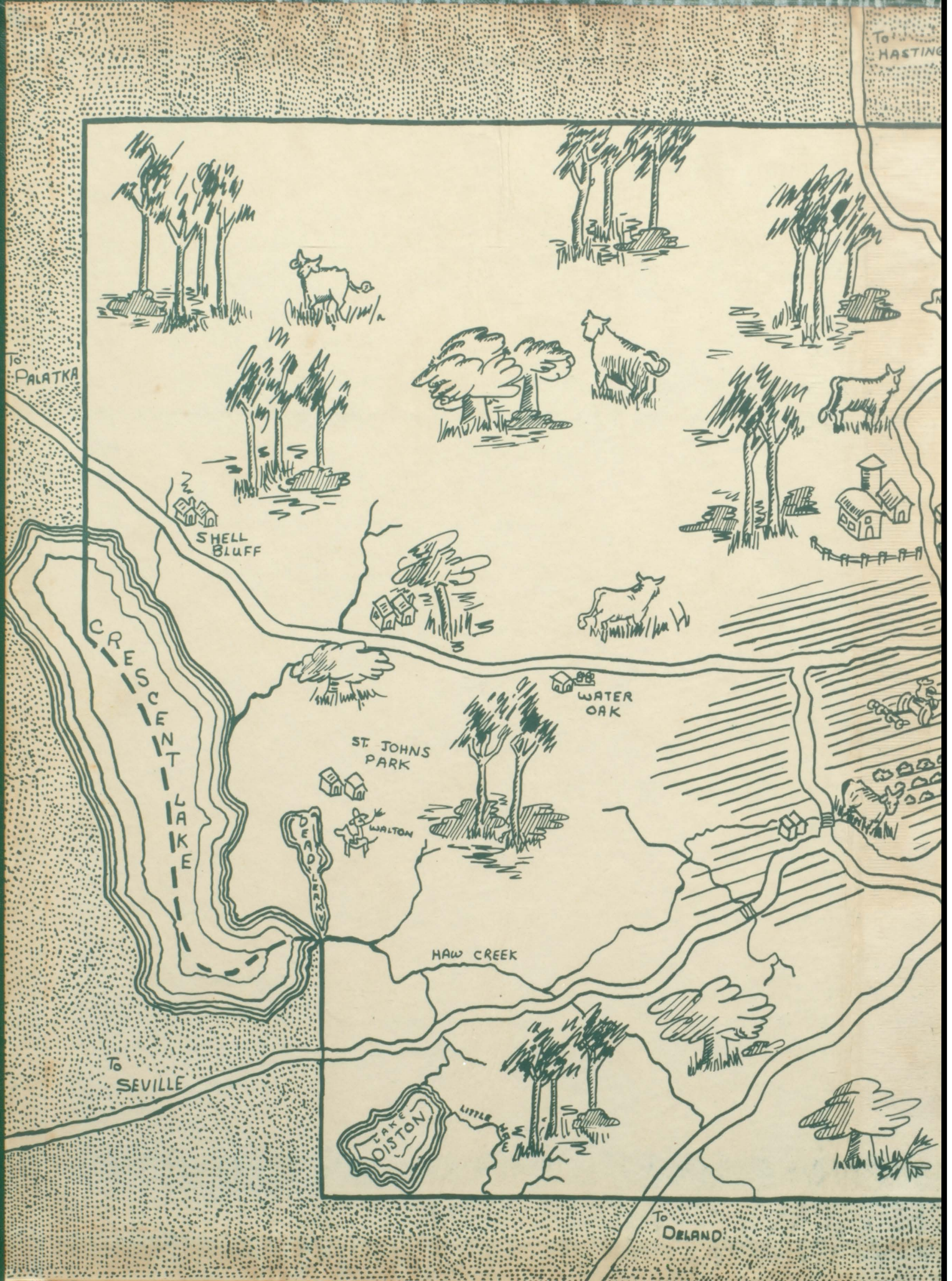

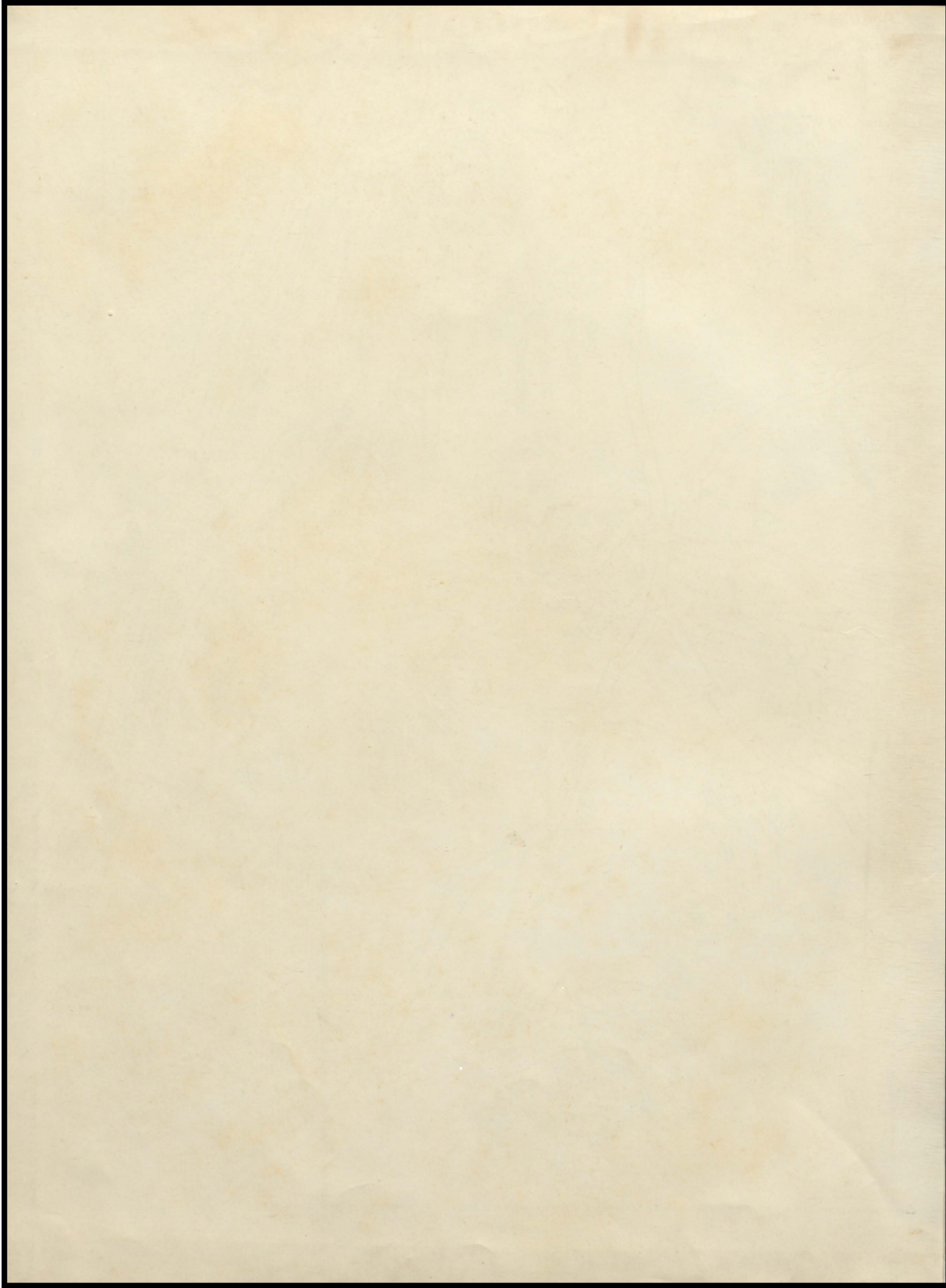

FLAGLER COUNTY COURT HOUSE

COURTHOUSE

The courthouse of Flagler County, centrally located in Bunnell was built in 1926-27. Its well-kept brick architecture reflects the appreciation of beauty and progressiveness of its people.

Besides providing county offices for clerk, judge, sheriff, superintendent of public instructions, supervisor of registration, tax collector, and tax assessor, the courthouse, also, serves as a meeting place for the county commissioners, and is the setting for the annual community Christmas programs, Memorial Day, and Armistice Day observances. During severe hurricanes the courthouse has served as a storm shelter.

Mr. Frank Mercer (shown on the steps) was a county commissioner during the time of its construction and the only member of the commissioners at that time now residing in Bunnell.

FLAGLER FORESTS

Flagler County is today rapidly expanding one of its greatest potential sources of revenue, the forest. With over 250,000 acres of commercial forest land, it ranks among the first ten counties in the state in the production of timber.

Fertile soil, warm humid climate and adequate rainfall in the county promote and maintain accelerated growth among our many species of trees. From our forests of pine, cypress and hardwood trees, many different products are harvested such as: lumber, pulpwood, naval stores, veneer stock, poles, piling, cross ties, fence posts and fuel wood.

Our most valuable tree is the pine and at least five different species are found in commercial quantities. These are slash, longleaf, loblolly, pond and sand pine. The most valuable trees in the hardwood group are the sweet and black gums.

With a good system of land management, proper protection from fires, and sound cutting methods, it will be possible for Flagler County to reap untold wealth from its forests in the future.

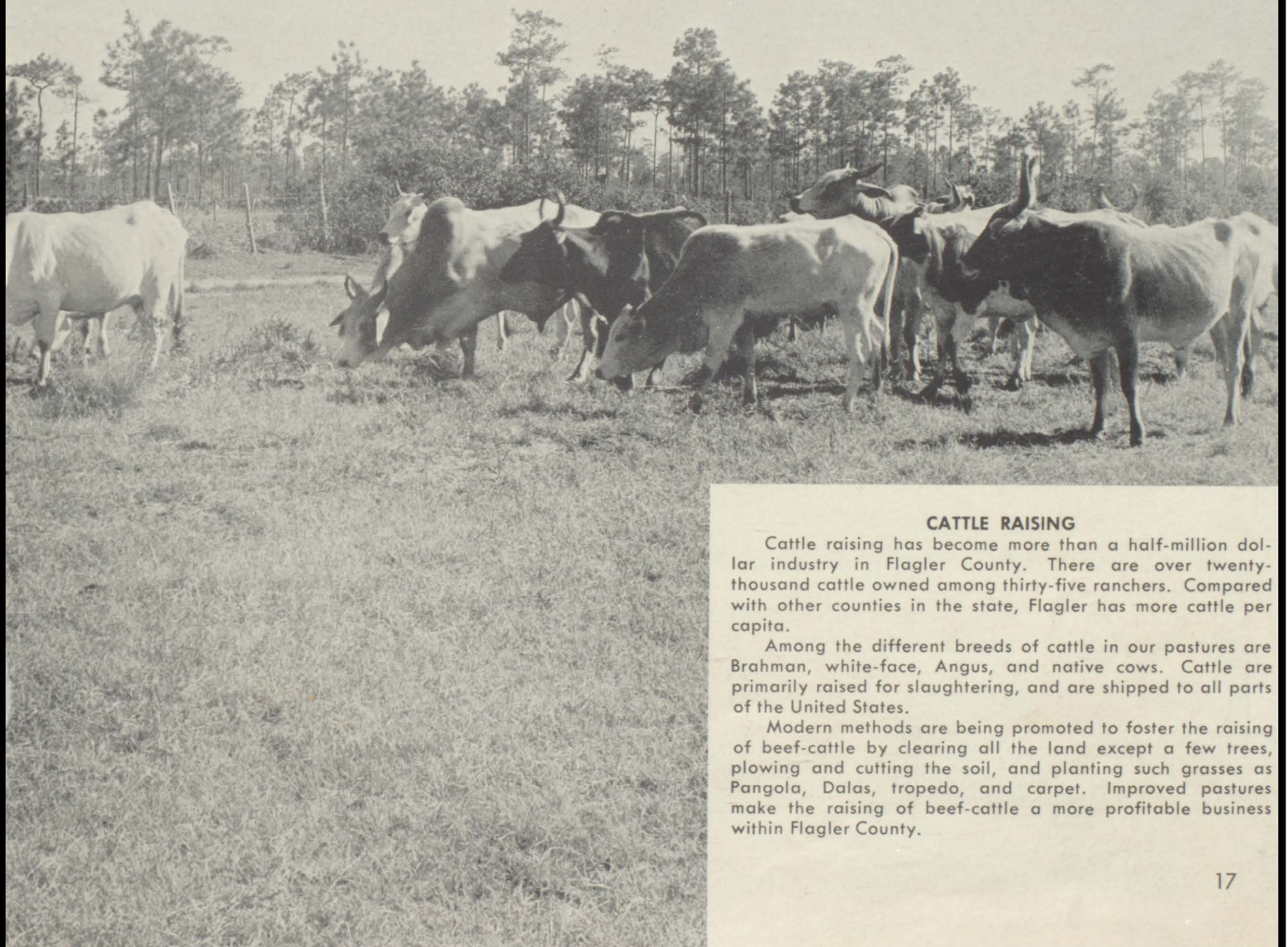

CATTLE RAISING

Cattle raising has become more than a half-million dollar industry in Flagler County. There are over twenty-thousand cattle owned among thirty-five ranchers. Compared with other counties in the state, Flagler has more cattle per capita.

Among the different breeds of cattle in our pastures are Brahman, white-face, Angus, and native cows. Cattle are primarily raised for slaughtering, and are shipped to all parts of the United States.

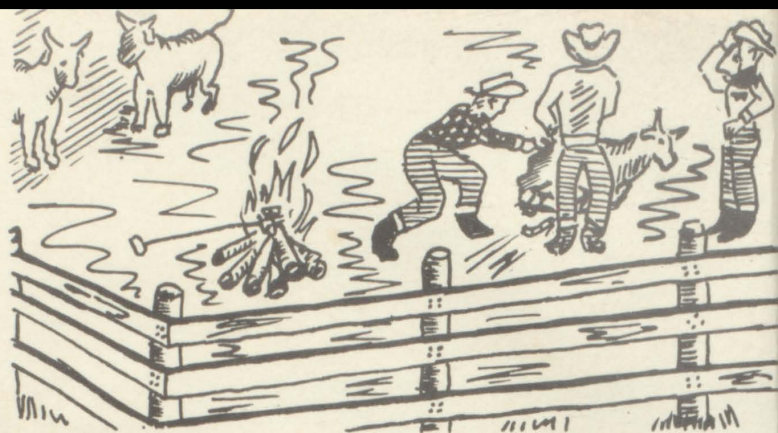
Modern methods are being promoted to foster the raising of beef-cattle by clearing all the land except a few trees, plowing and cutting the soil, and planting such grasses as Pangola, Dalas, tropedo, and carpet. Improved pastures make the raising of beef-cattle a more profitable business within Flagler County.

LEHIGH PORTLAND CEMENT PLANT

Several years ago the Lehigh Company discovered north of Flagler Beach the most extensive deposit of coquina ever found in the United States. These shells are massed in 311 ridges, each six miles long, and are from 800 to 1,000 feet wide and approximately 50 feet deep. It is estimated that the largest of the ridges contains 55,000,000 tons of coquina.

Coquina, rich in calcium carbonate, will take the place of the commonly used limestone, forming when mixed with low silica clays, the raw materials for Portland Cement.

The Bunnell plant, when in operation, will be the only one in the country using coquina as a base for its material. The plant is expected to aid local merchants and townspeople with its employment of more than 200 workers.

FLAGLER BEACH PIER

Each year the Flagler Beach Pier plays host to thousands of visiting fishermen, whose home towns represent a cross-section of probably every state in the Union.

Extending 656 feet into the Atlantic Ocean, the pier is equipped with fish cleaning tables, each of which is piped with fresh water. Depth of fishing water varies from 6 feet to a maximum of 15 feet at the pier's end. Live shrimp for bait is usually available together with mullet and similar dead bait. Benches along the pier add to the angler's comfort.

The pier house itself is used as a meeting place for the town's governing city commission. Tables are available for those who wish to play checkers, chess or cards.

Flagler Beach's broad sandy beach is protected by a city-employed, fully-accredited life guard whose duty-hours are planned to give a maximum of safety during the peak summer months.

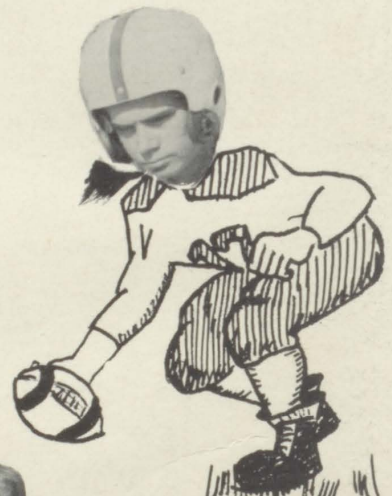
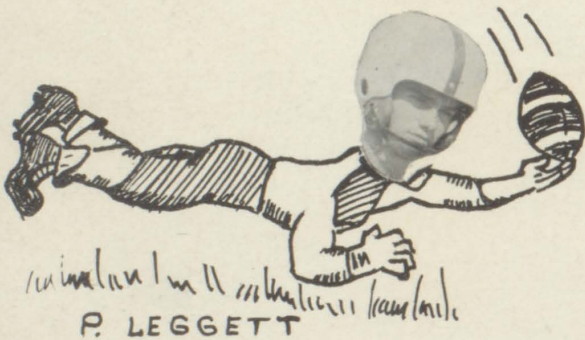

The tournament proved to be very successful and from all reports was enjoyed by all the visiting players, coaches and spectators.

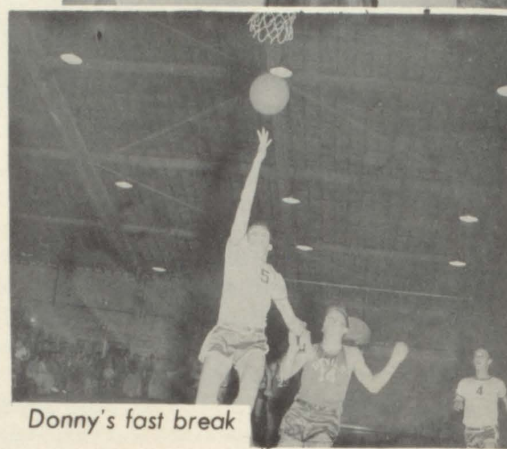
The officials were Anderson and Talley from Daytona Beach and Geilan and Higgenbotham from Jacksonville.

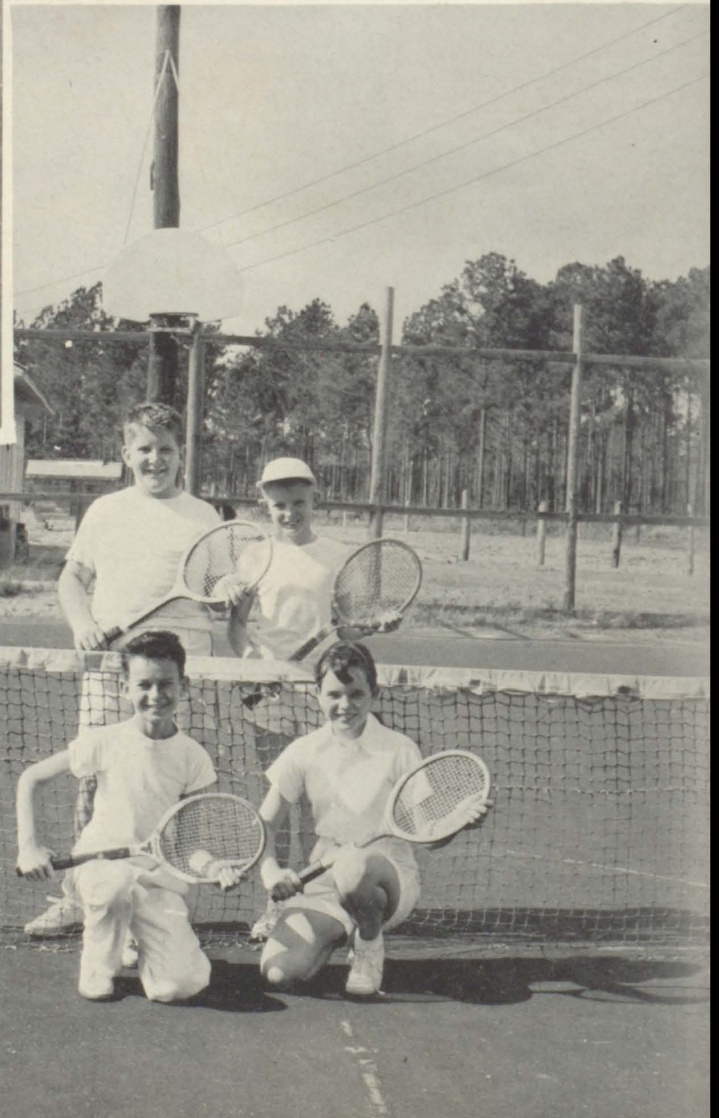

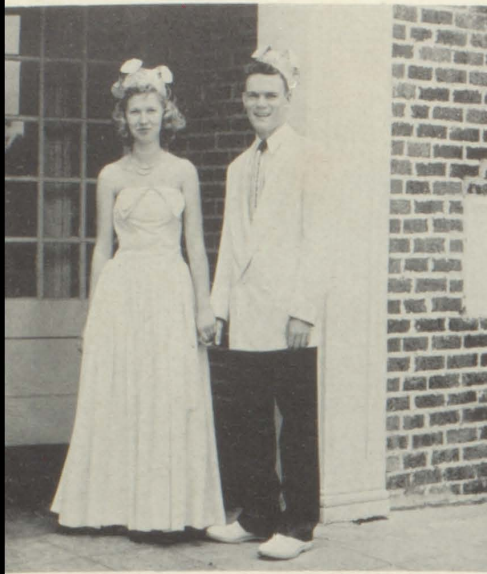
In the giant oceanariums at Marineland, the mysterious, colorful undersea world can be viewed through more than 200 portholes. Here life is not segregated by species, but lives under conditions comparable to that of the open sea.

The blue-green waters are pumped from the ocean at the rate of seven million gallons per day, and the floor of the huge tanks are covered with coquina, sea fans and gorgonia. In bright review parade porpoises, rays, giant sharks, turtles, and tropical fish.

At feeding time every morning and afternoon visitors at Marineland watch attentively the playful porpoises in the circular oceanarium leap from the water to snatch food from an attendant or guest-feeder's hand. An underwater diver walks on the ocean floor in the rectangular tank to feed by hand other marine animals.

Marine Studios, the world's only oceanarium, is located fourteen miles north of Flagler Beach on Florida highway A1A.

FARMING

Farming is one of the oldest industries of Flagler County, and is among the principal sources of income.

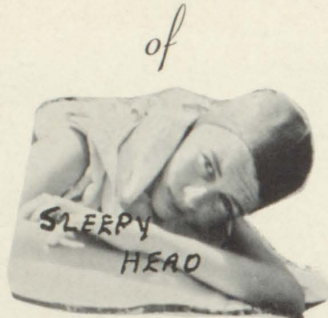
Over 232,288 acres are devoted to farmlands. From our farms are harvested potatoes, cabbage, hygear, corn, cauliflower, turnips, and other vegetables on a smaller scale. The main crops are potatoes and cabbage.

Potato season usually begins in December and lasts through January. With favorable weather a crop will mature within 90-120 days. Cabbage is planted in a seed bed in November, and about five weeks later they are replanted in the fields. Sixty days later they are ready for harvesting. Field peas, sesbainia, and coffee weed are planted for cover crops. Hygear and corn are used mostly for stock feed.

The largest potato-packing plant in the world, owned by Hastings Potato Growers Association, is located in Bunnell. Many tons of potatoes are packed and shipped to all parts of the world.
