The 1968 Pinea Staff is more than proud to dedicate this annual to Miss Sarita Bradley and Mr. T. C. (Top-Cat) Hein.




As we the seniors leave the corridors of BUNNELL HIGH SCHOOL, we leave many things—friends, classmates, football heros, and faculty.

### Senior Class History

On a beautiful September day in 1956, eleven first graders entered Bunnell Elementary School. The original members of the Class of 1968 in Bunnell were Lee Bourne, Karen Moody, Kate Strickland, Darrell Britt, Sharon Salyerds, Carol Smigielski, Sue Broadaway, Hewitt Dupont, Linda Knight, Tony Parker, and Jim Akins. In Flagler Beach Elementary School, there were four original members of the Class of 1968 — Jo Anne Wilson, Vicki Moore, Eleanor Shill, and Lu Lu McNab.

The next four years added several new students to our roll — Tina Pache in third grade; Jimmy Harper in fourth; Bobby Robinson in fifth; and Sharon Patrick and Henry Bowers in sixth.

When we entered the seventh grade there were many new experiences — and new students from Flagler Beach: Wesley Thomas, LuLu McNab, Jo Anne Wilson, Eleanor Shill, and Vicki Moore. Our float, "Lick 'Em Bulldogs," won a prize for the most original float in the Homecoming Parade.

In the eighth grade, Jo Anne Wilson and Tony Parker received the American Legion's annual "Good Citizenship School Award." Andy Waterman became a new member of the class.

By the time we were freshmen we realized we didn't have to be the first to get to the classrooms, and stopped running through the halls. Algebra was a big worry to many of us but we somehow managed to pass. The ninth grade welcomed Trudy Hall to the class. This was our first year of glory—the girls beat the seniors in intramural basketball.

The sophomore year meant work — for Biology was an exciting and new experience. Ray Krutz joined us that year. We also gained another win in intramural.









In our junior year came homecoming, magazine sales, proms, class rings, and the increasing realism that next year we would be SENIORS.

Our senior year was filled with plans for graduation and we thought we wouldn't survive those awful Senior Placement Test. Even though everyone warned us they were hard, we didn't believe they could mean "that hard." We gained six new students in our senior year: Alice Emanuel, Ernest Johnson, Theodore Alexander, Jeanette Scarbough, Martha Neil Johnson, and James Williams. Everyone by this time really wanted to beat our class in the ANNUAL INTRAMURAL BASKETBALL, because we were the only class to have won the plaques and remain undefeated.

Our last homecoming brought tears to the eyes of the senior girls, realizing that this was their last one. The class was honored that Jim Akins was chosen as our HOMECOMING KING.

There were fourteen proud seniors now, who spent thirteen fun-filled years in school in Flagler County. Four from the Flagler Beach School, and nine from the Bunnell School. These years were the most "fun" years of our lives. Many of us didn't realize this until after graduation. We see now, how much we would miss our classmates.

On May 30, 1968, thirty happy (some tearful) SENIORS became graduates of BUNNELL HIGH SCHOOL.








## Homecoming 1967
