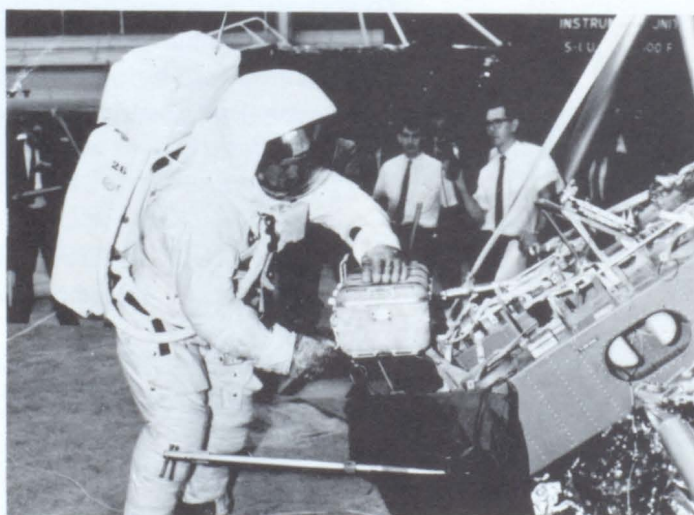


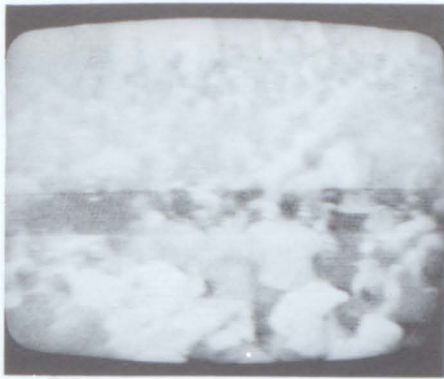

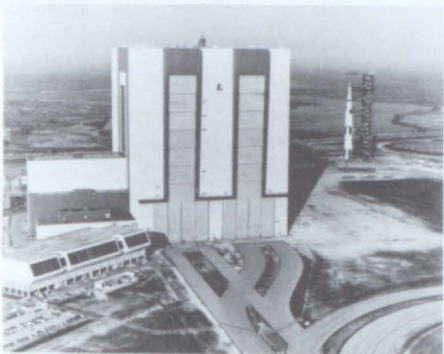

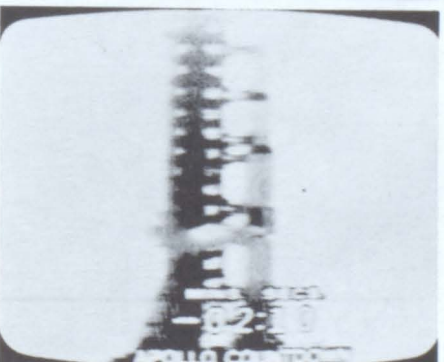

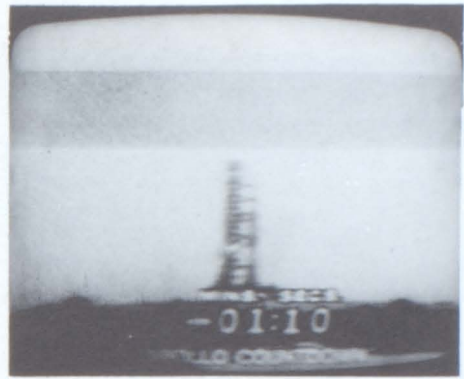

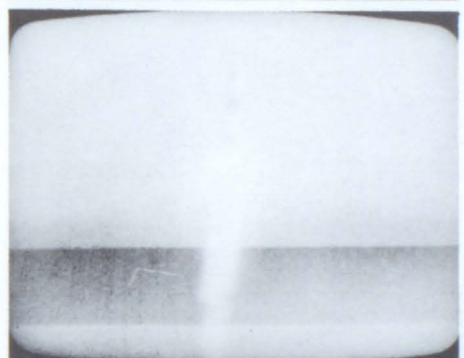

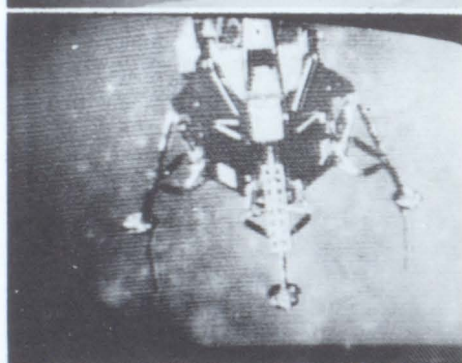
This close-up of the lunar surface was seen by the 3 Apollo 11 crewmen.

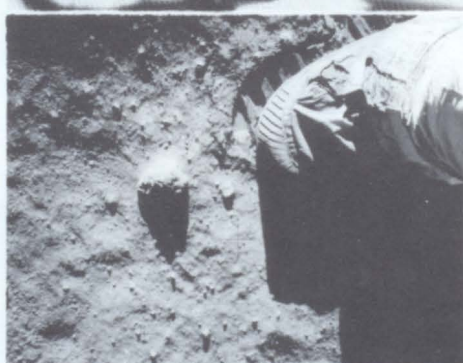

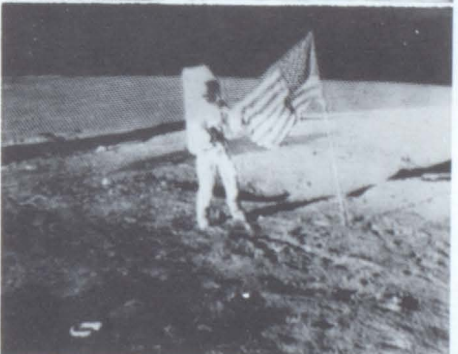

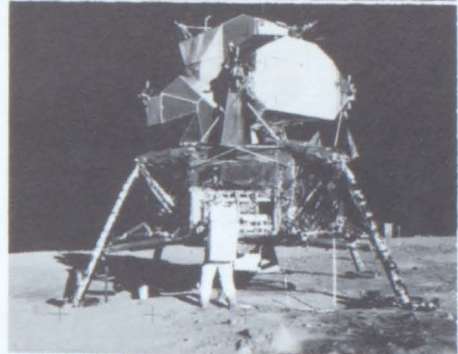

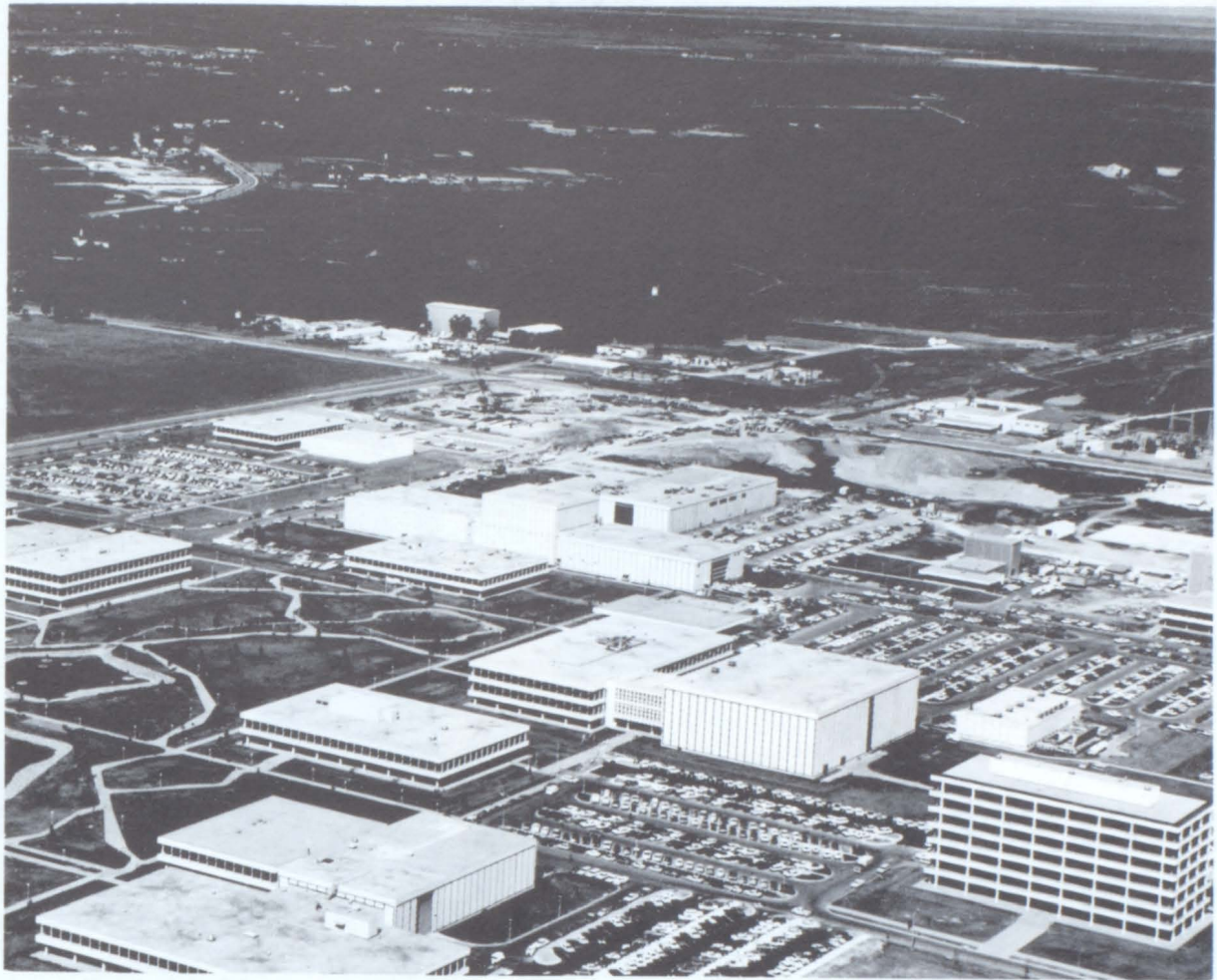

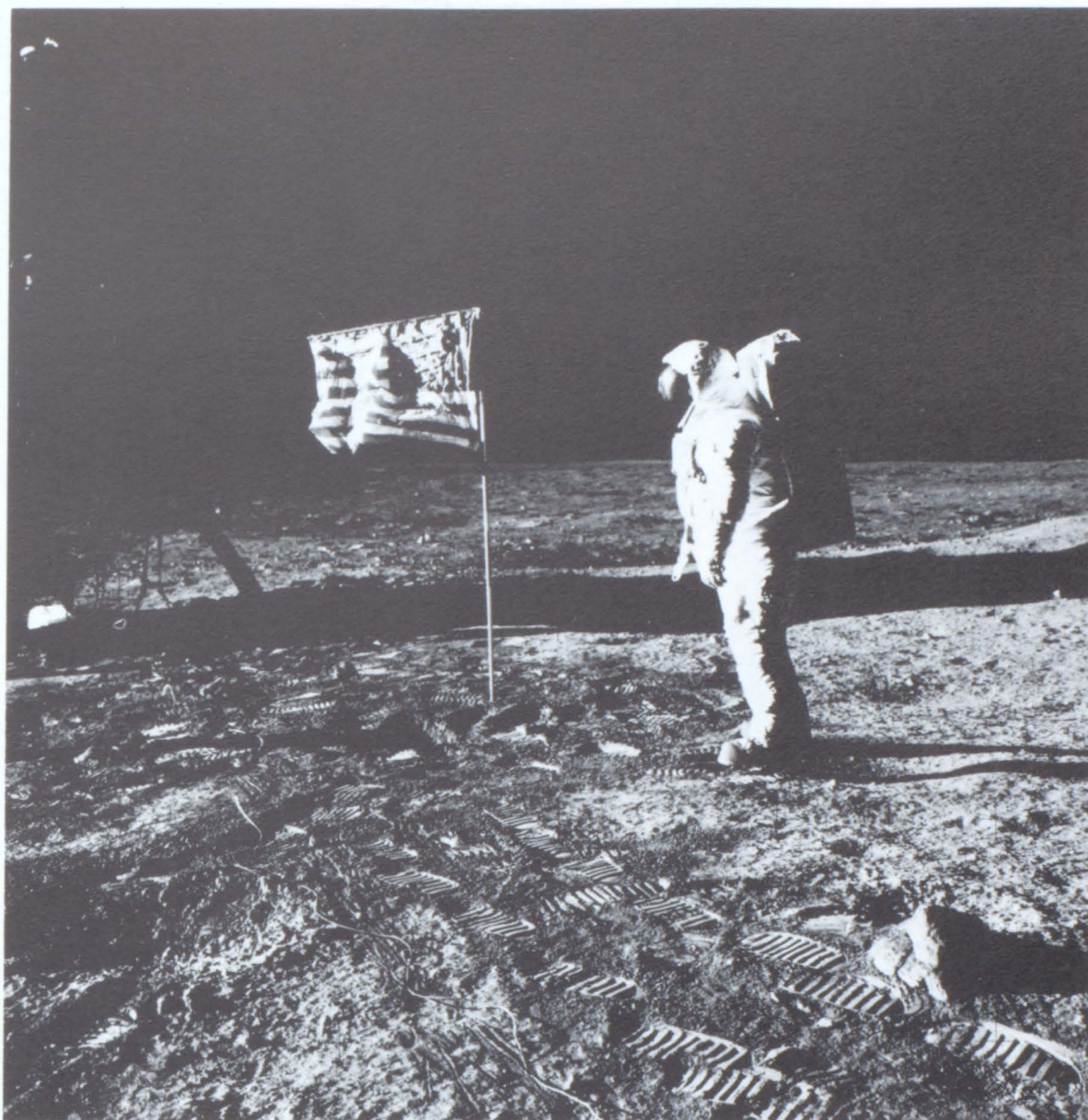

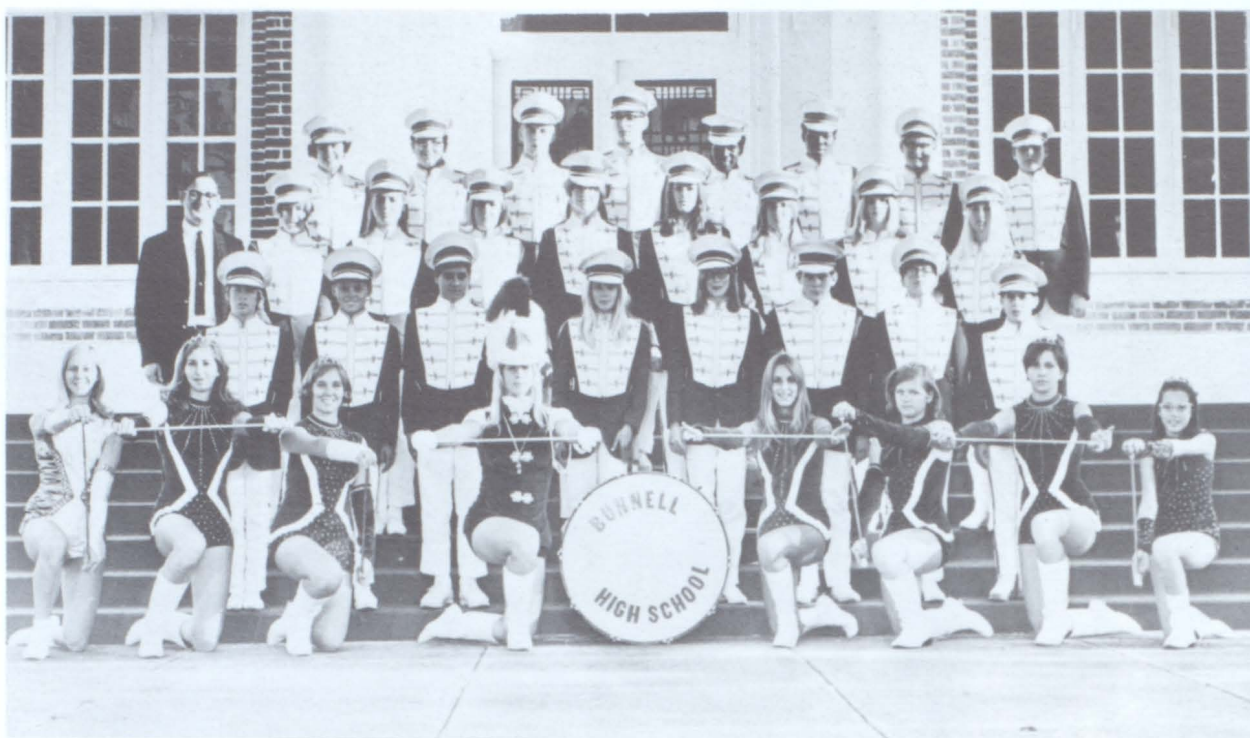

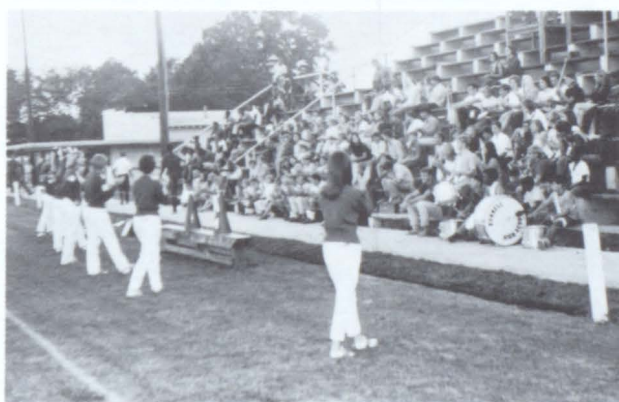
AN FORGETABLE HOMECOMING . .

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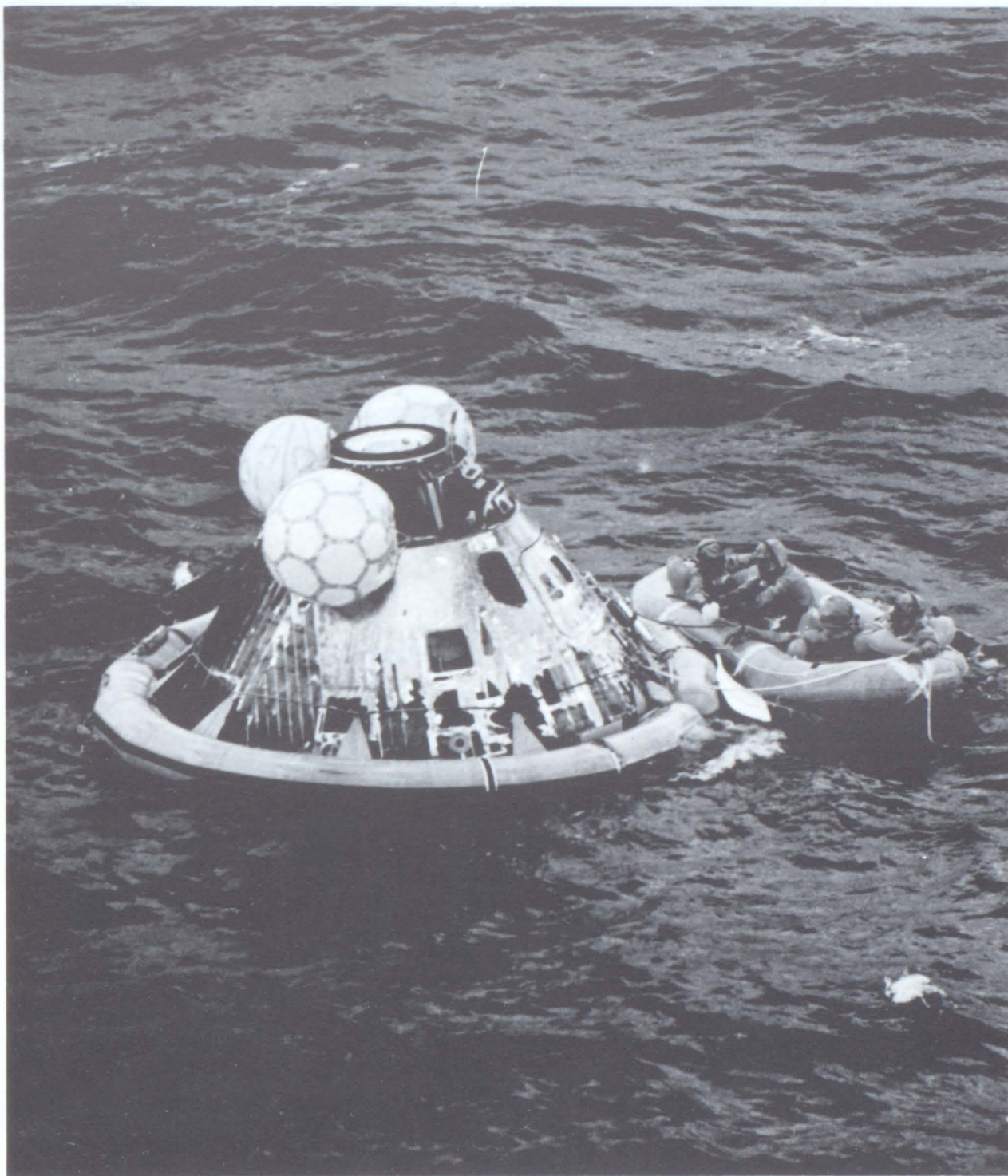

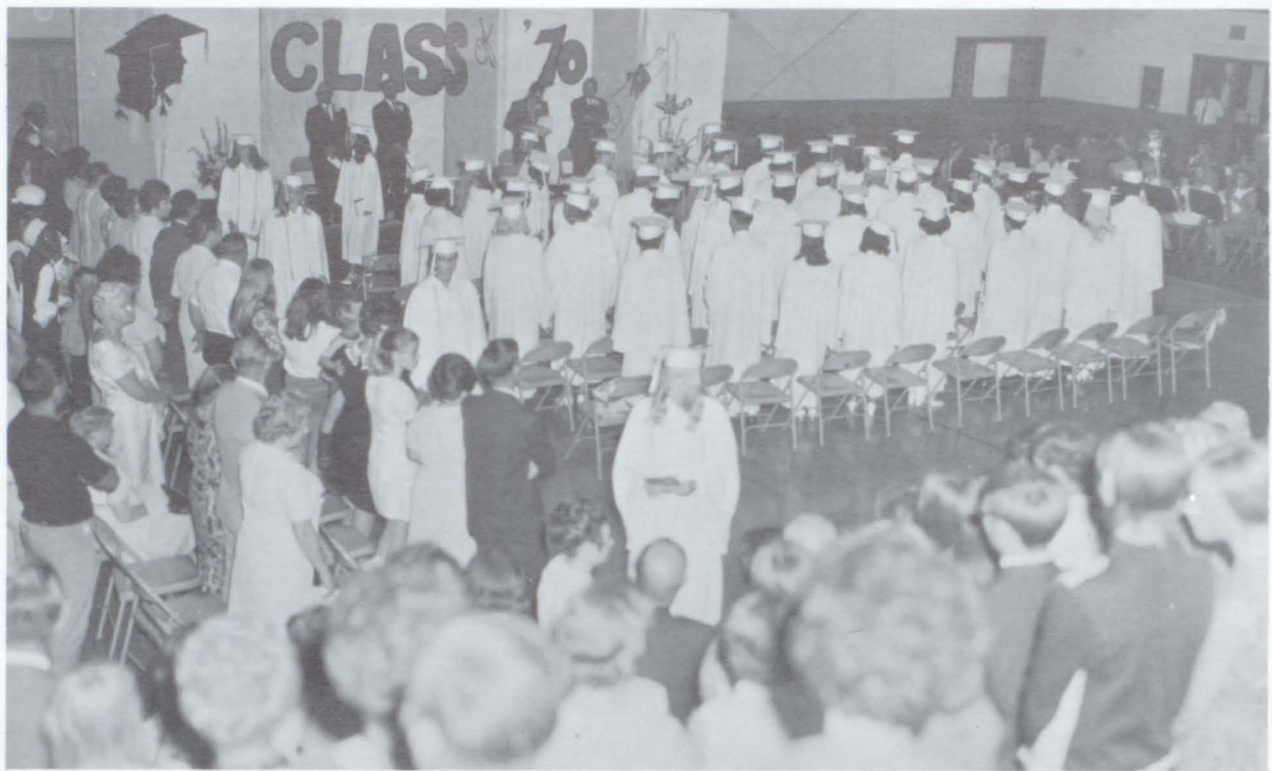
