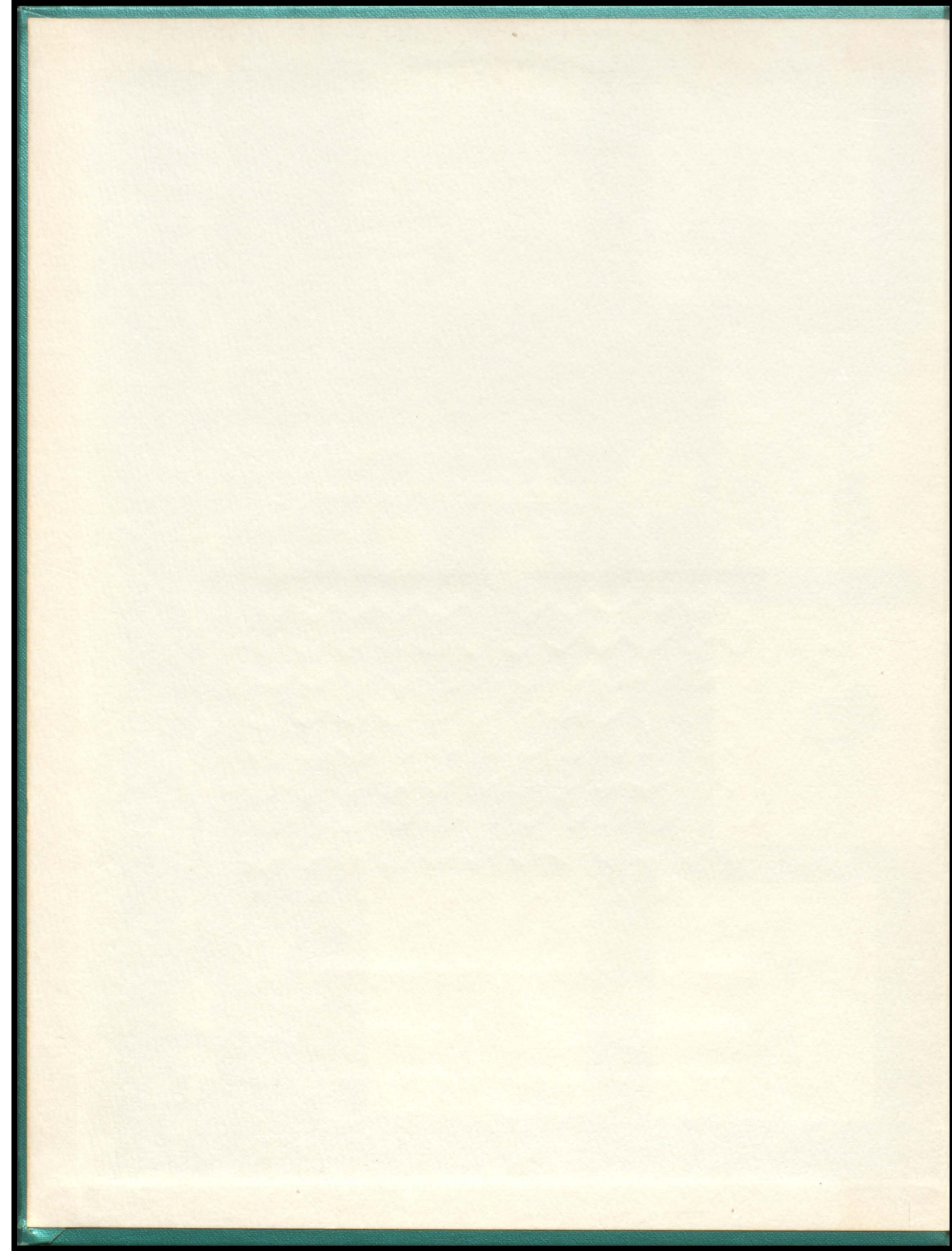


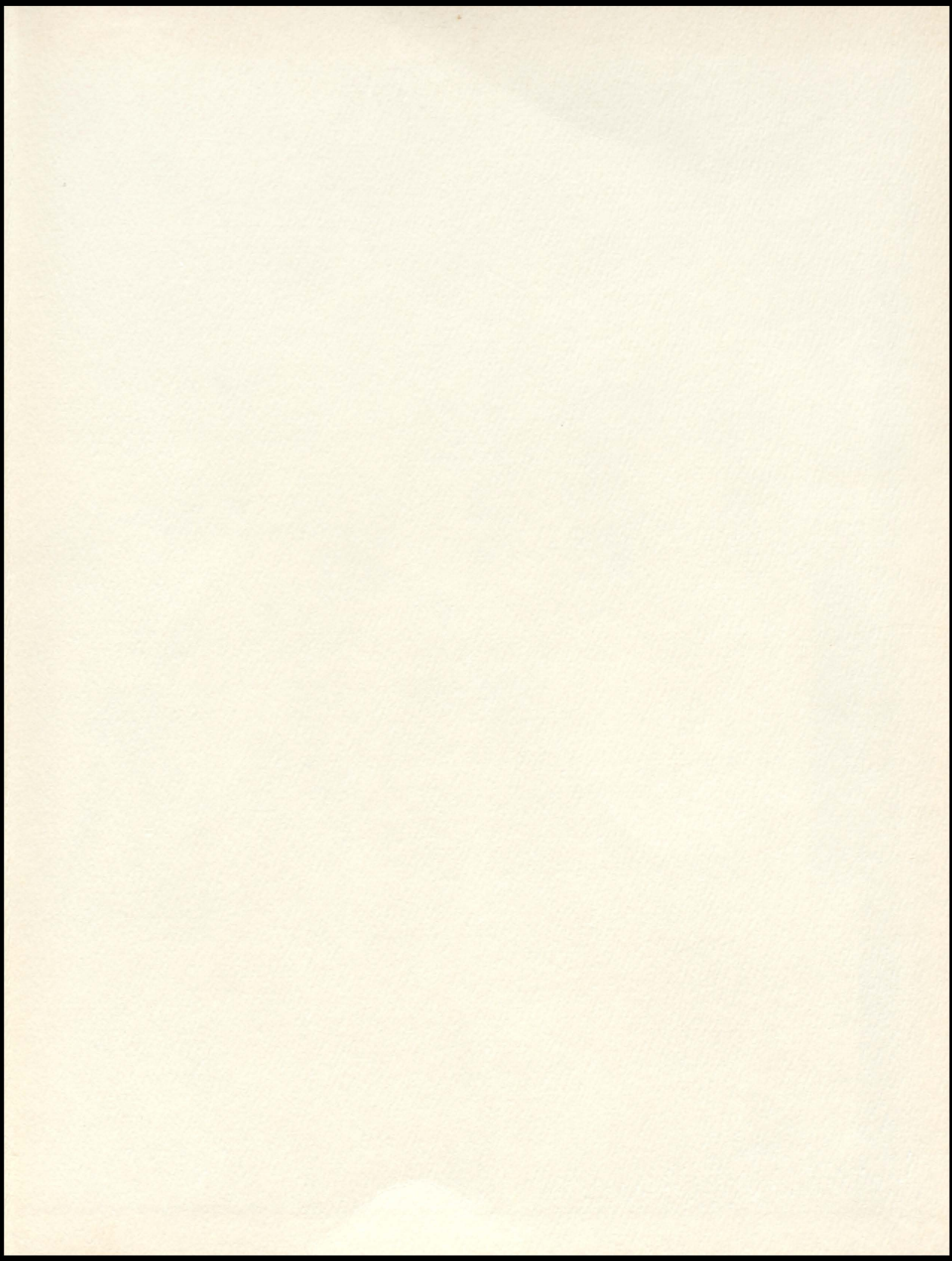


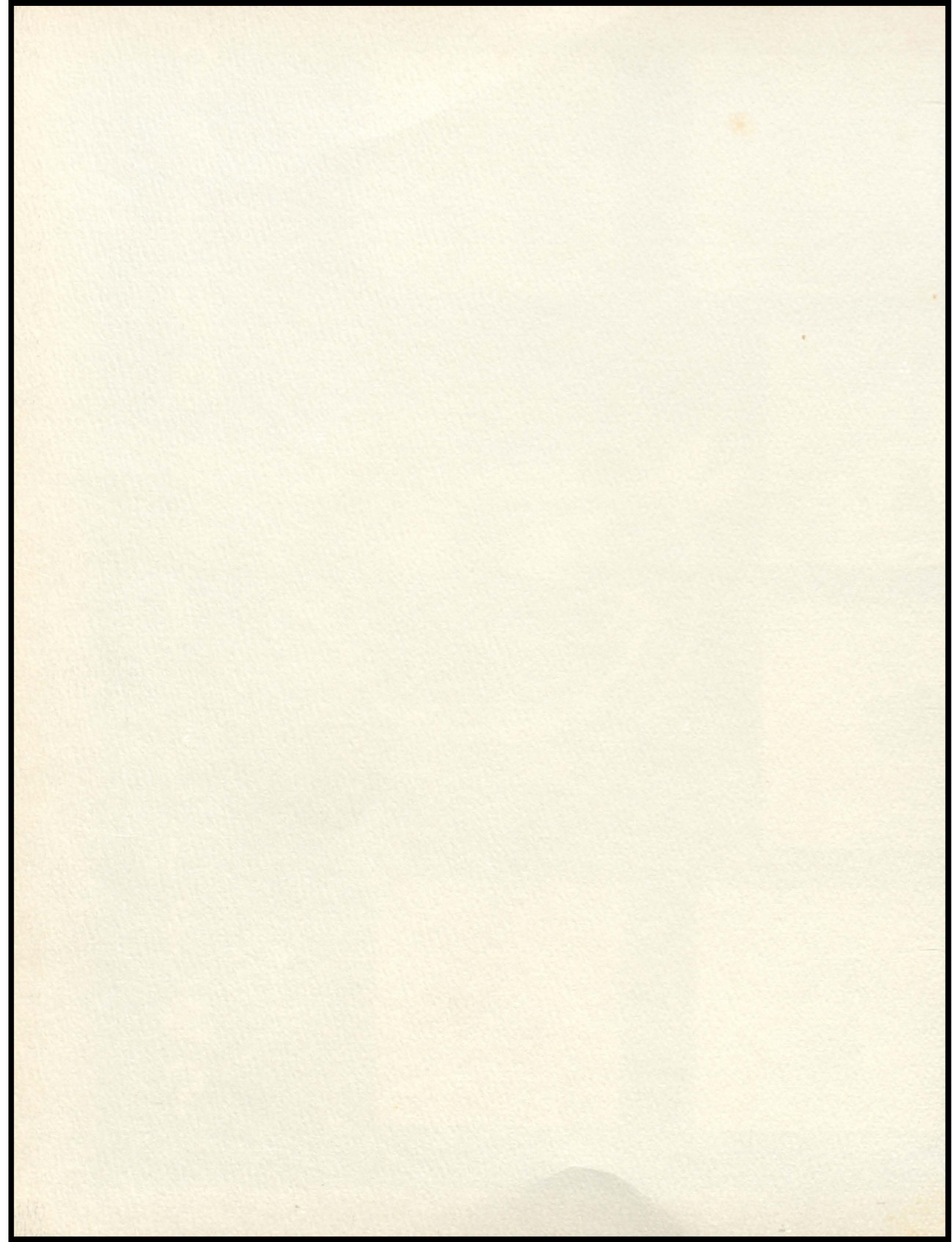

The first school in Flagler County was dedicated by a barbecue picnic on June 22, 1912.



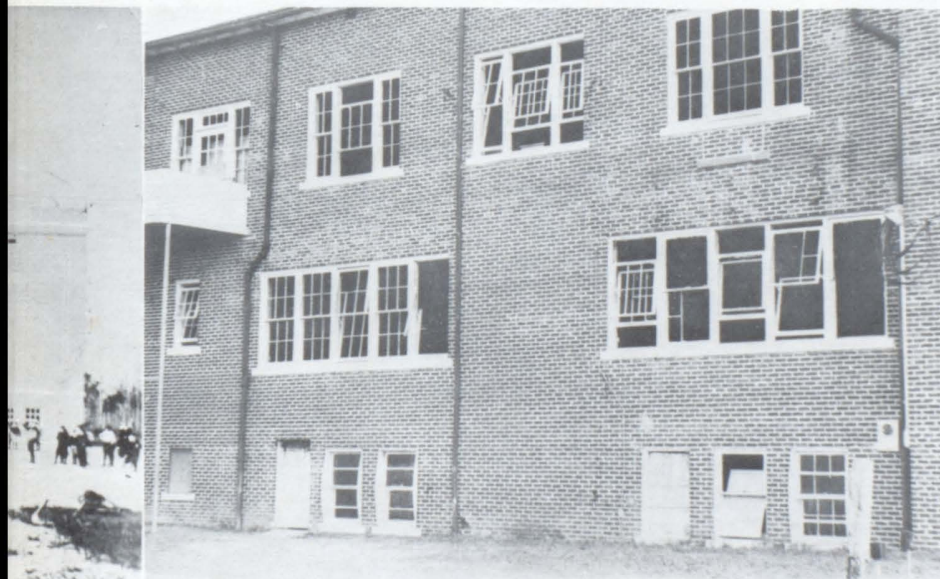
This is the old high school when it was newly built.

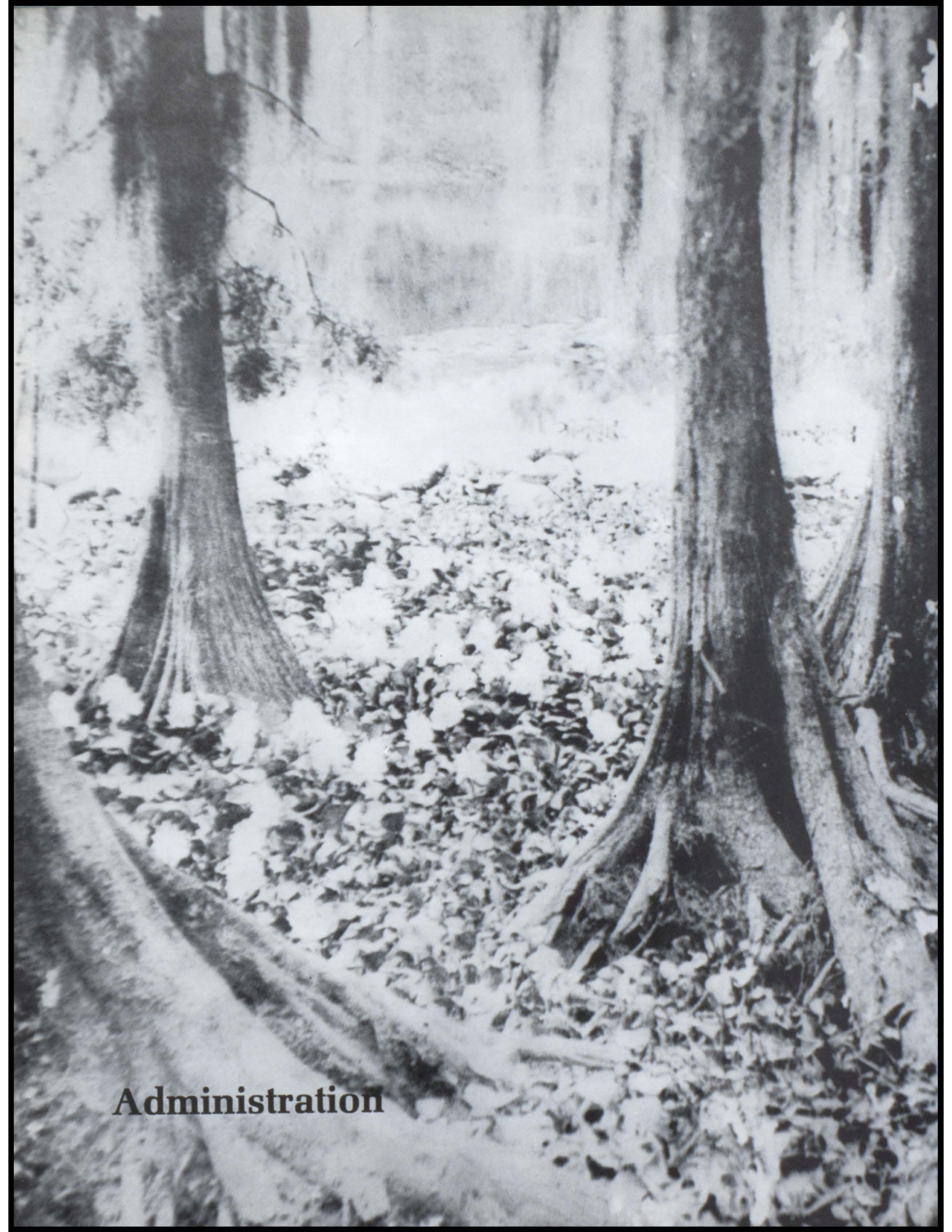
The old building burned in June of 1970.

With these thoughts in mind, we would like to dedicate our 1972 Pinea to those who are most dear to us . . . Our Parents.



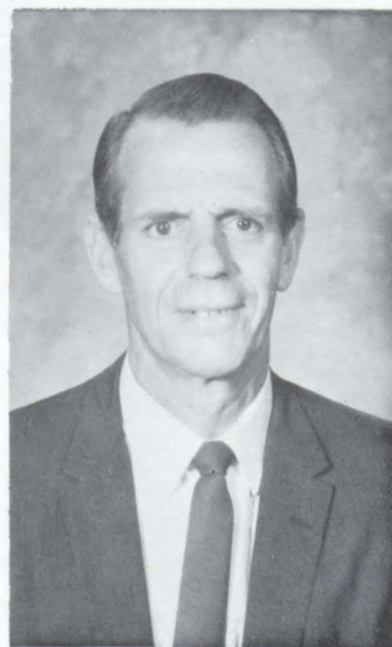

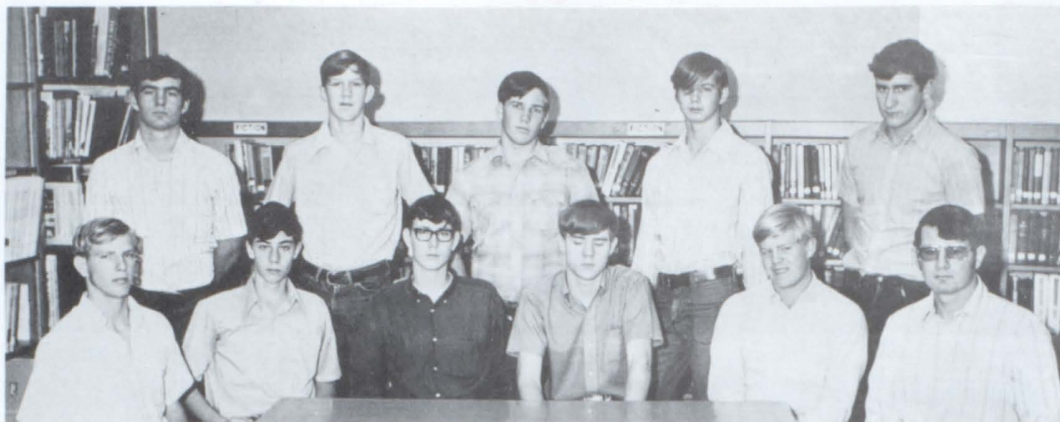
Substituting for teachers is one of many jobs of FTA

Coach Johnson has taught four years. He is now teaching Biology, Earth Science, and Ecology.

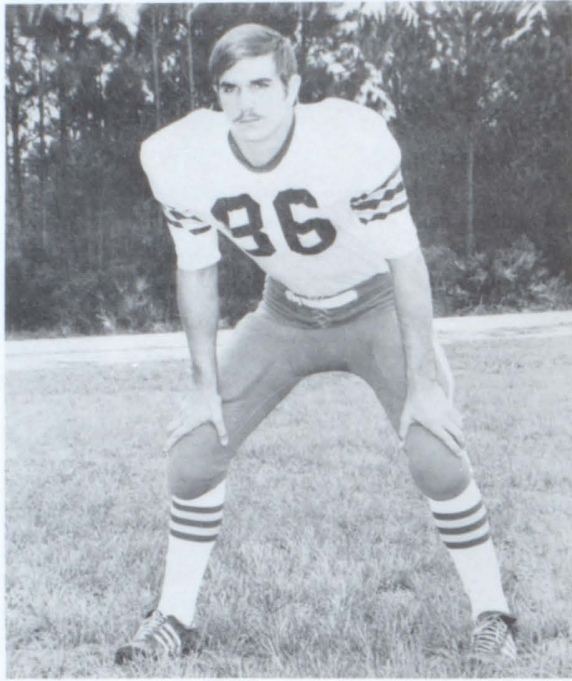
Robert Vance attended Cambridge High School, Cambridge, Ohio. He majored in Physical Education and Science at Ohio University.
