This is the old high school when it was newly built.



Robert Johnson attended high school in Ocala, Florida. He received his Bachelor of Science from Bethune Cookman College, Daytona Beach, Florida.




Varsity basketball displayed superior talent






At halftime during the homecoming game the homecoming queen candidates walked out onto the field with their escorts. Everyone had waited anxiously for days for this moment.


Miss Bunnell High 1972 Helene Bryan
